Legislative Update

The following legislative changes were enacted during the most recent legislative session:

Temporary Family Assistance (TFA):

Time Limits. Your eligibility for cash assistance is limited to 3 six-month extensions after the initial 21 months of eligibility. This means that, in general, you are limited to 39 months of cash assistance for your lifetime. However, you can qualify for more than 3 extensions if:

- You are unable to work because of domestic violence (or another reason beyond your control, such as fires or floods);
- o You have at least two substantial barriers to employment, including lack of child care, substance abuse or addiction, severe mental or physical health problems, a severe learning disability, domestic violence; or a child with a severe physical or behavioral health problem;
- You work at least 35 hours a week and earn less than the amount of cash benefits that you are eligible for; or
- You work less than 35 hours a week because of a disability or the need to care for a family member with a disability

There will be an absolute lifetime limit of 5 years for all families, unless you cannot work because of domestic violence. These changes are effective October 1.

Other TFA Changes. The amount of the first sanction was increased from 20% to 25%.

The child support disregard used in figuring eligibility for benefits during the first 21 months of cash assistance was reduced from \$100 to \$50.

Unmarried minor parents who have not graduated from high school must participate in a program leading to a high school diploma or its equivalent.

Medical Benefits:

The SAGA (State Administered General Assistance) medical program will no longer provide non-emergency medical transportation as a covered expense. DSS may also develop a primary care case management system for people getting medical assistance under the SAGA medical program.

Assistance

Pine Tree Legal Assistance is a nonprofit organization that gives free legal help to poor people with civil (non-criminal) legal problems in Maine.

Pine Tree operates a special Native American Unit in its Bangor, Maine office. The unit is staffed by attorney Craig Sanborn, part-time attorney Mike Guare, part-time Paralegal Danny Mills, and is headed by Eric Nelson. Craig is a member of the Penobscot Nation. He joined the Pine Tree Staff in September of 1998 Mike and Danny both joined the Unit last fall. Eric has worked at Pine Tree for many years on behalf of migrant farmworkers and Native Americans.

Pine Tree attorneys are not licensed to practice law in Connecticut. However, the Native American Unit may be able to give information and help to low-income Native Americans in Connecticut with federal legal problems, such as questions about the Indian Child Welfare Act and the Jay Treaty. Pine Tree can also refer cases to lawyers in Connecticut. The telephone number is 1-800-879-7463.



Federal Recognition Update

In January of this year, during the final hours of the Clinton administration, the Acting Director of the Bureau of Indian Affairs granted preliminary approval for tribal recognition to the Nipmuc Nation (the Hassanamisco Band) in Sutton, Massachusetts. The Nipmuc Nation's aboriginal lands extend into Rhode Island and Connecticut. The approval was put on hold, however, by the Bush administration. No further governmental action has been taken as yet.

A number of lawsuits are pending in federal District Court in Connecticut relating to recognition efforts. Two involve the Schaghticoke Indian Tribe. Among the issues that the Tribe is asking the Court to resolve is a request to force the Bureau of Indian Affairs to speed up its recognition process. See the Winter 1999 edition of the *Quinnehtukqut Legal News*. In April, the Golden Hill Paugussetts filed an action claiming that the Bureau of Indian Affairs had missed deadlines and violated their own rules.

Connecticut Attorney General Richard Blumental also filed a suit in January of this year. This suit accuses the Bureau of Indian Affairs of acting illegally in granting preliminary approval to the Eastern Pequots and the Paucatuck Eastern Pequots. Both Tribes have intervened in the case. The judge has ordered the Bureau to issue a final decision on recognition before the end of the year.

Finally, another petition for federal recognition has been filed with the Bureau of Indian Affairs. The Tribe is called the Native American Mohegans.

Benefits for Legal Immigrants:

State-funded benefits for legal immigrants were continued for one year.

Security Deposit Guarantee:

On October 1, it will become easier for you to use the security deposit guarantee program. You will now be eligible for a security deposit guarantee at any time after you receive a Notice to Quit. The rule had been that you were eligible only after there had been an eviction judgment. The guarantees can be for two months' rent. You are eligible for the full amount of the guarantee as long as it has been at least 18 months since a payment was made for a previous guarantee. If the 18 months have not yet expired, there will be no deduction unless you have been given an opportunity for a fair hearing to contest the deduction.

Rent Receipts:

On October 1, landlords will be required to give receipts for any rent payments or security deposits paid in cash. The receipt must state the date, the amount, and the purpose of the payment. The landlord must give you a receipt even if you don't ask for one.







Native American Legal Briefs

-- Tribal Name as Trade Name --

Connecticut Supreme Court Rules All Native Americans of Mohegan Descent Are Allowed To Call Themselves "Mohegan"

In February of this year, the Connecticut Supreme Court issued a decision in a case brought by the Mohegan Tribe of Indians of Connecticut, which owns and operates the Mohegan Sun Casino in Montville. The Tribe had asked the court to prevent The Mohegan Tribe and Nation and The Confederation of the Mohegan-Pequot American Indian Nation and Affiliated Tribes, Inc. from using the name "Mohegan." The case deals with issues of trademark law.

The Mohegan Tribe of Indians of Connecticut filed this case because the Tribe believed that the use of the name "Mohegan" by other Tribes would harm both its casino operations and the Tribe's ability to "preserve the culture, heritage and traditions of ... the Mohegan People."

The Supreme Court disagreed with the Tribe. Discussing trademark law, the Court noted that, in order to prevent others from using a trademark, a plaintiff must show that its trademark "is sufficiently distinctive to be worthy of protection." If a trademark is only "generic," however, it cannot be protected.

The Court concluded that the word "Mohegan" was, in fact, a generic name. The Court stated:

"Mohegan" is ... a term relating to or characteristic of a whole group or class, that may be used by any person of Mohegan heritage to identify himself or herself as a member of that particular group of Native American people. Indeed, a person of Mohegan ancestry cannot be deprived of the right to call himself or herself Mohegan, for there is no other term that can be used to refer to that unique and distinct ancestral group.

The Court also rejected the Tribe's argument that it was the only group allowed to call itself "Mohegan" since it was the only Mohegan Tribe to have received federal acknowledgement. The Court pointed out that the Mohegan Tribe and Nation had applied for federal acknowledgement and may yet be successful. The fact that the Mohegan Tribe of Indians of Connecticut has already gotten federal recognition does not mean that another Tribe cannot be recognized as a Mohegan Tribe.
